ADULT INITIATION (RCIA) - Process of initiation into the Catholic Church for non-baptized persons and Christians of other faiths.

CONFIRMATION - For adults and high school students.

BAPTISM OF CHILDREN - For registered parishioners only. Check with the office for scheduled dates. Two preparation sessions required. Parents and godparents should attend classes *before* the birth of the child to be baptized, if possible. Register in the office.

RECONCILIATION - By arrangement. Communal Service as announced. Also, on Saturdays: from 3:30 - 4:00pm.

MARRIAGE - For registered parishioners. Requires six (6) months preparation. Contact the office for details.

From the desk of Rosie Chinae, Director of Campus Ministry . . .

When was the last time you heard on the news or read in the newspaper about South America? In the United States media we hear a lot about the Middle East, terrorism, the United States economic crisis and the United States 2008



presidential elections. Yet, around the world people are suffering from hunger, poverty, shortages in water, violence, and much more. Once our eyes are opened to a world larger than the United States we begin to realize that the policies and choices we make here affect millions beyond our borders. For structures, economics, and politics to change around the world, towards something that resembles what Catholic Social Teaching embodies, things must change.

In 1998 the Pastoral Universidad en Puno (the Pastoral Ministry in Puno, Peru) was founded by the Diocese of Puno at the National University of the Antiplano. From 1980 to 2000 Peru had an intense and prolonged episode of internal violence where, according to the *Truth and Reconciliation Commission*, an estimated 69,280 individuals died at the hands of two rebel groups, the Communist Party of Peru - Shining Path, a Maoist guerilla organization, and the Tupac Amaru Revolutionary Movement. Their goal was to turn what they saw as a bourgeois democracy into a "new democracy," vastly tainted by communism. In light of these events, the first director, Fr. Esteban Judd, a Maryknoll priest, began Campus Ministry at the National University of the Antiplano in response to dialoguing and accompanying students whom had been affected by these crimes and human rights violations. This, in itself, forms a new conception of Campus Ministry, when compared to Campus Ministries in the United States. Because of this violent episode in Peru's history, the students I encountered not only lived most of their lives in fear and within a war-like climate, but they were also on fire to transform their society into a sustainable and thriving society while maintaining their indigenous identities, attempting to ensure that these human violations do not reoccur.

"What you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me (Matthew 25:45)." Repeatedly, from different sources, I heard that United States policies thoroughly affect the lives of South Americans; this was referred to as the *theory of dependence*. Our policies on *Free Trade*, economics and lack of solidarity when it comes to global economics, our own "modern" lifestyle choices, our abuse of the environment and lack of environmental education, are all issues that affect the lives of South Americans. How do we respond? What are we truly saying

we are interconnected and interdependent, yet we do not act as if there is a world outside of the United States? One of my first days in Peru I was fortunate enough to hear Barbara Fraser, a National Catholic Reporter writer, speak about the social, political, and economic reality in Peru. The five other campus ministers I was traveling with in Peru and Bolivia from the United States, after listening to Barbara talk, were truly desiring to *do something* to help the cause of those in Peru. She left us with a challenge that I am going to leave you with. What issues touch you in your heart and soul? What else do you need to know about this issue? Who can help you learn about this issue? By learning about an issue you are passionate about, in depth, you can begin to answer the question of what *you can do* to build bridges of solidarity with those around the world.



RCIA is a process/journey by which unbaptized; members of other faith traditions or baptized but uncatechised Catholics are received into the Roman Catholic Church or complete their sacraments of initiation.

The Aquinas Newman RCIA operates on a year-round schedule to serve those who wish to inquire into or begin this journey. While those who are not baptized may only enter the Church at Easter, it may be beneficial to some to become involved early in our community for support and spiritual direction. If you know of anyone who is seeking to learn more about our Catholic faith, or who need to complete their sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation) please contact **Kyle Kemp**, Director of Religious Education (247-1094 ext. 15) or **Raymond M. Jones**, Coordinator of Christian Initiation (265-4019). RCIA meets each Tuesday evening from 6:30 to 8:30 P.M. in the "**Hangout**" once the process is underway.

Right now we would like to begin the **Pre-Inquiry Period** for the summer. Any non-Catholic person interested in exploring the Catholic Faith (unbaptized or baptized in another faith tradition) or baptized Catholics who have not been taught the faith tradition of the Catholic Church (have not received first communion **and** confirmation) should contact Raymond M. Jones or Kyle Kemp at the contact numbers above or look for a member of the RCIA team after each Mass. We would also like to extend an invitation to those fully initiated Catholics who may have ceased practice of the Catholic faith but would like to "**Come Home**" to the Catholic Church to contact us for a spiritual renewal process designed to assist your spiritual growth and renewal.

Our first Pre-Inquiry session will be held in the Library on this Sunday, July 20, 2008 at 1 p.m.
