The Worshipping Assembly at Mass

The beauty of our participation in Mass has a far deeper meaning than just “chipping in.” Here are some highlights from the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) that I hope will encourage you even more in your prayer.

The celebration of Mass is a corporate act of the whole assembly gathered for worship. All particular ministries serve this corporate function. In Mass, the Church is joined to the action of Christ, *the high point both of the action by which God sanctifies the world in Christ, and of the worship that the human race offers to the Father, adoring him through Christ, the Son of God, in the Holy Spirit.* We are joined to this divine action through baptism, which incorporates us into the risen Christ. This action, at the center of the whole Christian life, is not initiated by us but by God acting in and through the Church as the body of the risen Christ. It becomes our action only to the extent that we give ourselves to this mystery of redemptive worship. The liturgy is designed to bring about in all the worshipping assembly *a participation of the faithful both in body and mind, a participation burning with faith, hope, and charity.* To the extent that we are able to participate, the work of redemption becomes personally effective. Such participation, the GIRM says, makes the actions and prayers of the liturgy our own; we enter more fully into our personal communion with Christ's redeeming act and perfect worship.

In the Mass, the faithful give thanks to God and offer the Victim through and with the hands of the priest. They endeavor to make this clear by their deep sense of reverence for God and their charity toward others who share with them in the celebration. They become one body by hearing the word of God, joining in prayers and song, and above all by offering the sacrifice together and sharing together in the Lord's table.

Because the whole liturgy is a corporate act of the assembly, there are certain parts of the Mass that are made by the whole assembly, congregation and all ministers, in order to express the corporate nature of this act. Through these actions, the entire congregation joins itself to Christ in acknowledging the great things that God has done and in offering the sacrifice. These acts include participation in or by:

- Listening with reverence to God's word;
- Engaging in dialogue of spoken and sung prayer: acclamations, greetings, and responses;
- Actively joining in common postures and gestures;
- Communal silence;
- Including themselves in the incense offering;
- The greeting of peace, a sign of ecclesial communion and love for each other; Specific spoken prayers and texts, namely: the penitential rite; profession of faith; communion; the offering during the Eucharistic Prayer, intercessions; Lord's Prayer; prayer of humility before communion; the offering during the Eucharistic Prayer,

spoken or chanted by the priest, but where all should join as Church to offer the "spotless Victim to the Father in the Holy Spirit" and "offer themselves and so day by day to surrender themselves, through Christ the Mediator, to an ever more complete union with God and with each other, so that at last God may be all in all"; Liturgical song, because singing expresses both the corporate nature of worship and the intense union achieved between God and the Church in Christ through the Holy Spirit. A union so intense and total that it is described as a union between lovers whose nature is best expressed vocally in song. Singing unifies and focuses the individual, thus encouraging that "participation in body and spirit that is conscious, active, full, and motivated by faith, hope, and charity."
